Our Vision

The idea for our newsletter came about during one of the teacher's STePs meetings where ideas were discussed and shared for Reconciliation Week 2022. The theme for Reconciliation Week 2022 was 'Be Brave, Make Change'. As a group, we agreed starting a newsletter for our community created by our students was 'brave' and sharing information, events and news from the STePS schools and our local community would bring about the 'change' we wanted to see. We are aiming to give our students and communities a voice and to build and strengthen relationships.



The Junior Aboriginal Educational Consultative Group (AECG) is a group made up of Aboriginal students from all seven schools in the STePS community. They range in age from 11 to 18 years.

The aims of the Junior AECG is

- To ensure Aboriginal Cultures are represented and embedded throughout the school environment and curriculum.
- To empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students through real and active participation in school decision-making.
- To provide a platform for Aboriginal student voice.
- To advocate for Aboriginal Education.

Our Junior AECG members meet together once a term to represent the Aboriginal students' voices of their schools and share their ideas and opinions.

The next student meeting will be held in Week 8 Term 4 at James Erskine Public School

Stage 2 and 3 have had the pleasure of weekly classroom visits from Steve Trist. Mr Trist has been teaching us about hunting, traditions, storytelling and has brought in artefacts like boomerangs and kangaroo skins which students could interact with. Students created artwork using their own interpretations of traditional stories, experimenting with the use of Aboriginal symbols to share a message. Steve put on some performances playing instruments such as the didgeridoo and taught the history and customs regarding music in Aboriginal culture. A BIG thank you to Steve for sharing his fountain of knowledge.









COCKATOO ISLAND

Late last term we enjoyed a special excursion to Cockatoo Island. We travelled by train and ferry on a great sunny day to explore one of the larger islands in our harbour. We spent the day exploring convict buildings, underground tunnels, the remains of shipbuilding and the native flora and fauna. Mr Trist was an excellent guide and pointed out how plants were used for a variety of purposes including a hair comb and medicine. The best part of the day was the "Marry Me" signwriting above the Harbour Bridge that prompted Mr Trist to talk about how young men and women married a long time ago. We loved to take in the cities sights and we can't wait for our next trip to Lizard Log!

Clairgate PS had a fantastic week delving into the importance of culture, respect and acknowledgment.






Erskine Park High School

There are native and smaller plants planted in your new yarning circle and we have planted bush tucker in our garden beds that we hope to use for cooking and education throughout the school.




