

Friends of 10 activity

Use your tens frame to place 5 counters or anything you have at home in the top row, starting from the left. How many more do you need to make 10. **Example:** 5 counters in the top row. I need another 5 to fill my tens frame. So, I can say that my friend of 5 is 5 because 5 + 5 = 10.

Repeat this activity for other numbers. Write your matching friend each time.

Another example: A friend of 4 is 6, because 4 + 6 = 10. Use your tens frame each time. Extra challenge: If you wish to practise your friends of 20 you can do the same thing by using 2 tens frames and writing down your matching friend to make 20. Example a friend of 15 is 5, because 15 + 5 = 20.
